# Very Important Windham School District Meeting and Vote on Monday, November 26 at 7 PM at the Windham Elementary School

From the Windham School Board, submitted by Carolyn Partridge

On October 1, 2018, the Windham School Board voted to warn a vote on the following articles, for a vote on November 6 by Australian ballot:

Shall the voters of Windham Town School

District, if the State Board of Education votes to merge the District into West River Modified Union Education District (also sometimes referred to as West River MUUSD):

- 1. Authorize the School Board to sell the Windham Elementary School building, associated land, and all associated school-related personal property, including the school bus, to the Town of Windham; and
- 2. Authorize the School Board to close Windham Elementary School effective, June 30, 2019, and to provide for the elementary education of the District's students by paying tuition, in accordance with law, to any public elementary school, or to any approved independent elementary school of the students' parents' choice?

A Windham resident pointed out that in order to have an Australian ballot vote, we would have had to warn a meeting to have a vote to do so. [Windham votes from the floor unless we have a Town Meeting to vote to have an Australian ballot.] We thank that resident for letting us know, and can only say that we were relying on what turned out to be incorrect information from the Secretary of State's office, for which they have apologized. In short, the school vote on November 6<sup>th</sup> will not happen. (Continued on Page 2)



In order to move forward in a timely way, we have decided to have a meeting of the Windham School District on November 26<sup>th</sup> at the Windham Elementary School at 7 PM. Having a vote from the floor does not require an informational meeting, but we felt strongly that we should proceed to have the informational meeting that was warned for October 29<sup>th</sup> at 7 PM at the school. This meeting was to allow people to be better informed, and prepared to vote on November 26<sup>th</sup>.

School Board members have been asked if we will definitely take action to sell the school to the town, and close the school. The article authorizes us to sell and close the school if the State Board of Education votes to merge us with the West River Modified Union Education District (WRMUED), but does not require us to do so. If we are forcibly merged, the WRMUED will take possession of our school, land, and the school bus. If that were to happen, we would no longer have control over what happens to our building, etc. It would be under the control of the eleven-member WRMUED Board upon which we have one member.

The concept of selling our school to the town would protect our assets and allow the town to use the building for the purposes that we want. There is a group in town that is researching the creation and accreditation of an independent elementary school that could lease the building from the town. The details of the sale would be worked out with the Select Board members, but it is anticipated that it would be sold for a nominal price.

This could well be to the advantage of the taxpayers of Windham. Under the current education



If you would like to register to vote, or request an absentee

ballot be mailed to you, you can do that now, and here's how: 1) you can come into the Town Office, or 2) you may register, or request an absentee ballot, online at <a href="https://www.sec.state.vt.us/elections/voters">www.sec.state.vt.us/elections/voters</a>, or 3) you may call or email the Town Office to request an absentee ballot.

Be sure to turn your ballot over to vote for Windham Justices of the Peace.

On Tuesday, November 6, the Town Office will be open for voting from 10 AM-7 PM. If you are in line to vote at 7 PM, you will be allowed to cast your ballot. All absentee ballots must be turned in by the close of polls at 7 PM.

funding mechanism, for every dollar we spend on the upkeep of the school, Windham taxpayers send two dollars to the State. If the town owned the building, taxpayers would pay on a one-to-one basis. Municipal taxes would go up slightly, but education taxes would go down.

If we vote to approve this article, the Windham School Board would continue to exist and would oversee the payment of tuition to any public elementary school, or to any approved independent elementary school of the student's parents' choice. Our payment would be limited to whatever the State allows for elementary tuition reimbursements. If an independent school is established in the Windham School [building], that tuition payment would be limited in the same way.

To give a broader picture of the situation, on October 17th, the State Board of Education preliminarily voted to forcibly merge Windham into the WRMUED. Their final vote is planned for November. The next step is for the WRMUED to warn a vote of the district electorate to accept us into the WRMUED. If the voters reject the idea, we could continue as we are. If they accept us, we could take steps to sell and close the school.

Additionally, the Windham School District will be participating in a lawsuit against the State on a number of grounds, including that this is a "taking" of our property without the voters' consent. Any Windham resident who would like to sign on as a plaintiff is invited to do so. A letter will be available for your signature as soon as the details are worked out. These steps should be replaced with a set of wooden steps with a grate, to allow the water to pass through, rather than splash up on the building. Many thanks to Russ for his help.

Well, the Selectboard has been very busy attending meetings, classes and talks. We're always trying to improve the quality of the work we do for you! One recent and important thing we've done is appoint Richard Paré as our Road Commissioner. Richard brings much experience and knowledge to the position; we are so glad to have him onboard. We look forward to a long and successful collaboration with him. You might have also noticed Ralph Wyman lending a hand. We extend a big thank you to Ralph for stepping out of retirement and back into our road equipment until we get the highway department settled. If you see them, along with Dan Diaz, our newest road crew member, give them a wave and say hello. (Rumor has it they might even enjoy some home-baked goodies on occasion.) They work long and very hard to keep our roads safe for travel. Some of the projects they've been working on as they prepare for winter are installing the new, very large, street signs [mandated by the state], replacing 5 failing culverts, cleaning ditches, grading roads and getting equipment and supplies winter-ready. Whew! Let's wish them a safe winter season.

And that goes for you too – let's all be safe. Please slow down when conditions warrant it. Our motto is "SAFE ROADS AT SAFE SPEEDS". The new road crew team is planning to focus extra attention on balancing efficient use of salt and sand while keeping the roads safe for travel. You may notice some changes in the plowing route, with the salt and/or sand application timing and quantity, and when the roads are "clean & dry" again after a storm event. Please keep in mind that as vehicle owners and drivers, you can have a positive impact on road safety by insuring that your winter tires are in good condition and by driving at a speed that is appropriate for the road conditions – and THAT MAY WELL BE UNDER THE SPEED LIMIT.

And please, if you see anything in town that needs the crew's attention, let us know. We can't be everywhere, all the time, but you can be our eyes around town. 

He has been instrumental in conserving over 26,000 acres in Vermont, including Black Mountain, Eshqua Bog Natural Area, Equinox Highlands, and more recently, part of Turkey Mountain ridge in Jamaica, VT.

## **Button Up Vermont Kickoff**



### **Fire Company News**

September 21 - Windham Hill Road, automatic fire alarm. 4 responded.

September 25 - Burpee Pond Road, tree fallen on electric line with sparking. 2 responded.

October 1 - Windham Hill Road, mutual aid with Londonderry Rescue Squad for lift assistance. 5 responded.

October 12 - White Road, chimney fire.4 responded.

On Wednesday, October 10, 2018, the Windham Fire Company responded to an alarm at the Windham Elementary School; all for the purpose of celebrating Fire Prevention Week. The students were shown the workings of the fire engine, learned the items of the turnout gear the fire fighters wear, and asked multiple questions. Inside the school, they viewed a movie and engaged in a Q & A session with the fire fighters regarding safety in the home.

Cold weather is creeping upon us. Did you have your chimney cleaned in anticipation of burning in your wood or pellet stove, or fireplace? Vermont leads the nation in the use of wood heating per capita. Heating and cooking fires in Vermont continue to be the leading causes of home structure fires. The leading factor contributing to home heating fires is failure to clean creosote from solid-fueled heating equipment chimneys.

To maintain a safe home, have your chimney or wood stove inspected and cleaned annually by a certified chimney specialist. Use only seasoned hardwood and good quality pellets (soft, moist wood accelerates creosote buildup). Dispose of wood ashes in a metal container that can be tightly closed, douse with water, place the closed container outside your home, away from wood decks, building or other combustible materials. Leave in the container for several days before disposing of them.



### Time for the Annual Flu Vaccine!

Influenza, commonly called "the flu", is a contagious respiratory illness cause by a virus that affects the nose, throat and lungs. Influenza spreads from person to person when an infected person coughs or sneezes. Unlike the common cold, the flu can cause serious illness and can be life-treating. Each year, influenza is estimated to be responsible for at least 9 million cases of disease, 140,000 hospitalizations, and 12,000 deaths. Last year the death total jumped to over 80,000 deaths.

The flu vaccination is recommended for everyone age 6 months and older. High-risk groups include: pregnant women, breastfeeding mothers, all adults 50 years of age and older, residents of nursing homes and other long term care facilities, healthcare workers, travelers, people with certain chronic medical conditions, people with a compromised immune system, anyone with a condition that can compromise respiratory function and people at

In addition to getting your flu shot, simple everyday actions can help stop flu in its tracks - wash your hands with soap and water, cover your nose when you cough and sneeze, avoid contact with sick individuals, and stay home if you're sick.

Symptoms of flu may include fever (usually high), headache, tiredness and weakness, dry cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body or muscle aches, nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea. A person who is sick with the flu is contagious. Adults can be contagious from one day before having symptoms to seven days after getting sick. Children can be contagious for even longer than seven days.

# Winter Squash is in Season

Have you picked up some Acorn or Delicata squash from a farmers market? Maybe you were lucky enough to receive some from a very generous local grower (Looking at you, Russ Cumming!). Here is a tasty way to prepare them.

Delicata squash is easily recognized by its oblong shape and orange or green stripes. As its name suggests, this mild squash has a delicate skin that doesn't require peeling and can be eaten. Acorn squash has distinctive longitudinal ridges on its exterior and sweet yelloworange flesh inside.

#### Parmesan Crusted Delicata Squash Rings

1 Delicata Squash

1 egg

½ teaspoon garlic powder

½ teaspoon sea salt

1 cup grated Parmesan Cheese

A sprinkle of dried basil and oregano

Marinara sauce for serving

Preheat oven to 350F. Cut the squash in half and scoop out the seeds. Cut squash into ¼ inch rounds. In one bowl, whisk the egg, garlic powder, and sea salt. In a

second bowl, place the grated Parmesan. Coat the squash with the egg mixture and then drop into the Parmesan, completely coating the squash. Place on a baking sheet lined with parchment paper. Sprinkle with dried basil and oregano. Bake for 20 minutes until golden brown. Broil on high for an additional 2 minutes to get them nice and crispy, if needed. Serve with marinara sauce.

While squash varies slightly in sweetness and taste, you can usually substitute one for another in most recipes. Acorn squash also tastes great prepared this way. It's crunchy, salty, and garlicky - great for a game day appetizer.

This led us to visit the cooperating farms he's collaborated with for many years, including Taft Hill Farm, Meadows Bee Farm, the Field House, and of course Kermit's collection of birds and animals at Tara. Invariably we dined at the West Townshend Café, which is always a terrific experience, with its local food and community atmosphere. These were such memorable experiences, I realized that if ever an opportunity arose, I might just want to move here.

As fate would have it, that circumstance presented itself, and I searched the area for a perfect spot to nest. Kermit's cousin Khawaga from Egypt made his first visit to the USA last January (during a blizzard, and one of the coldest periods in recent history), and decided that he might like to live here too. He was completely blown away with the West Townshend Cafe, especially Jennifer Hoitt's unique baked goods which are like nothing he had experienced before. When the Cantina Vidorra on Elliot Street came up for sale, a confluence of life opportunities manifested. Khawaga would have a business, with which Kermit and I would collaborate

(with mentorship from Phyllis!). This would give us an opportunity to experiment with a business model that focuses on growing local employment opportunities by utilizing the Slow Food/ Farm to Fork movement, with focus on sustainable agriculture.

Our business is called The Old Egyptian Tea & Noodle house, located on Elliot Street near the Harmony parking lot. Our signature dishes are modern fusion - based on 18th century recipes from Egypt's indigenous cultures (from Kermit's grandmother), and made from local ingredients. Indigenous Native American dishes are also permanent menu items. Local farmer and culinary artist, Andy Earle, is our head chef, and we are working together in collaboration with the Culinary Institute of America's extern and intern programs. They were invaluable in the development and success of Kermit's first experiment in food/farm/art, Mount Kisco's critically acclaimed Flying Pig restaurant. The Old Egyptian will open in November (or December) 2018, from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM, 7 days a week. We have designed it as an immersive "place to be", where folks can relax, drink tea and socialize in a relaxing atmosphere.

I am now a resident of Windham, having purchased the former Mountain Grove Farm on Burbee Pond Road. We are refurbishing the house and property to create an educational center in cooperation with the Slow Food/Sustainable Agriculture movement already underway here. Our apprentice internships will include animal husbandry, with emphasis on forest pasture and selective breeding of a Windham Mithun Ia large bovine of northeastern

India and China], Taft Hill Copper Scotch hens, and Windham sheep (the two latter breeds nearly 20 years along in their development). The interns will also participate in the creation of our unique dishes at The Old Egyptian. I am the owner/creator of the Pet of the Day websites, which is my mainstay. Please visit petoftheday.com.

### Silver Medal for Epimediums




