The Windham School Board then extended their thanks and appreciation to all involved for making this abnormal school year so successful for the Windham students. Beautiful flowers were gifted to all staff and support staff in thanks.

Special recognition was given to retiring teacher Sally Newton. After 24 years of teaching and mentoring students, and leading such special programs as the Farm

Program at Meadows Bee Farm, the Ukelele After-School Program, and the Walking and Running Club, Sally has decided to retire.

Selectboard News

First of all, we hope this finds you all healthy. When we last saw each other at Town Meeting, we didn't know what was on the horizon, with respect to COVID-19. We remember Marcia telling us how important it was to wash our hands for 20 seconds minimum, singing through "Happy Birthday" twice. We've been doing that for three months now, with no sign of letting up. We are reminded daily about personal hygiene, social distancing, staying home if you are sick, and covering up your mouth and nose. And you know what, it seems to be working for us here, in our little slice of Vermont.

Even though our lives have pretty much been turned upside down, the business of the Town goes on. Our Town Clerk has kept the office open and has been "getting it done". The Road Crew has been on the job, through a few more snow storms (!) and now other kinds of road maintenance. The Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer and Listers have all been reporting for duty to make sure the Town stays on course. Let's give them a great, big cheer!

We would be remiss if we didn't mention all of the other essential workers around Town who have kept on moving and working hard so that we can stay healthy and safe – the fire fighters and law enforcement, store clerks, nurses, doctors, sanitation workers, maintenance workers, mechanics, farmers, teachers, plumbers, electricians, USPS, UPS and FedEx guys/gals, other delivery folks – the list goes on and on. Thank you! Thank you so much!

The Selectboard has also been continuing our work too, though meeting on Zoom, rather than in-person. The meetings have been just as full of content, and lively as ever. We've been working on updating our Highway Ordinance, and along with input from Windham residents, we have been drafting and reviewing an Animal Control Ordinance. It will include a section pertaining to any incident where a person is bitten by a domestic pet. The purpose of this ordinance is to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the public, and also of domestic pets, domestic animals and wolf-hybrids of the Town of Windham. This proposed ordinance is being reviewed by the town attorney. After the Selectboard adopts the ordinance, there is a sixty-day public comment period during which all Windham residents and property owners are urged to review the ordinance, before it is passed. During the public comment period, it will be posted on the Town of Windham website and in the Town Office.

We adopted our Local Emergency Plan (which we hope to never have to use) and secured a donation from Microsoft to make The Meeting House an open Wi-Fi Hotspot. This is in addition to joining a group through the Windham Regional Commission that is working to bring broadband to all of Windham in the near future!

We are here for you. If you need to, please reach out to us. And please, above all else, stay safe and healthy. Maureen, Kord and Peter

Windham Regional Broadband Update

The Windham Regional Broadband Project is moving forward. The Town of Windham has joined the Deerfield Valley Communications Union District (DVCUD). Another important milestone was reached when the



Vermont Public Service Department approved the DVCUD Broadband Feasibility Study. This approval allows the development of a detailed business plan that will go out to bid to several interested fiber optic network construction providers. It is anticipated that the build-out of the network and initiation of service would follow in a three to five year timeframe. Funding will come from federal, state and private sources. Responding to the 2020 Census - Everyone Counts

Here are some current facts regarding the progress of the 2020 Census in Vermont. The Vermont response rate as of mid-June was 51.2%, **nearly 10 points behind the national average**. Handdelivery of the form was suspended on March 15 due to COVID-19. Windham County, where 40% of households will receive their census paperwork through hand delivery, has a very low response rate of 35.9%. The Census Bureau restarted its

counting efforts in June and has begun door-to-door delivery of the form. You can respond from home and don't need to wait for the form. The deadline for responding has been extended to August 14, so anyone can go on the website at www.my2020census.gov to be counted, or if you are unable to respond online, you can take the census over the phone, toll free, at 844-330-2020. It's quick and painless.

Your participation affects school lunches, plans for highways, support for firefighters and families in need, so not responding can have costly consequences for Windham and its surrounding communities. Your responses to the 2020 Census are safe, secure, and protected by federal law. You will be asked a few simple questions, like age, sex, and the number of people who live in your home, including children. The process takes less than 10 minutes. The census will never ask for Social Security numbers, bank or credit card numbers, money or donations, or anything related to political parties.





A Tale of Two Houses

Since buying property on Old Cheney Road, I have built two houses that provide insight into the qualities of energyefficient homes. For me, it has



been a learning experience with satisfying results.

My first home at 1113 Old Cheney, built in 1996, started out as a single-family home, focusing on comfort and the views outside. It has many large windows – the ones from the south and west provide "solar gain" by bringing the warmth of the sun into the house, while the ones to the north and east lose more heat than they gain. Many of the windows are double-glazed, keeping the cold out in winter. The walls are seven-inches thick and insulated with fiberglass batts providing an R-value of 19, which was considered the best practice at the time.

Over the years, the house grew into a three-family apartment house, and I tried different heating methods, including radiant floor heat, hot-water baseboards, and Rinnai room heaters. All are powered by propane. The water heater is a traditional one, also powered by propane. Most of the light bulbs were fluorescent bulbs and are now LEDs. A few years ago, an energy audit was done, and a few minor steps were suggested, like providing a better seal on an outside door.

When my wife, Mary McCoy, and I built a second home more recently, we decided to make it as energy efficient as possible, and with our concerns about climate change, we chose to use very little fossil fuel. Our first step was to install solar panels to produce the power for building our house, and then living in it. The power generated goes into the grid in Green Mountain Power's net metering program – they pay us for what we generate, and we buy power back from them for less than what we're paid.

Throughout the house's construction, we received advice about conservation from Efficiency Vermont. As recommended, the house is small and compact, less than a quarter of the size of our first house. All windows are double-glazed. The ones to the north and east are small, and the windows to the south and west are larger. Most windows are to the west, providing solar gain and great views of the Turkey Mountain Ridge. The walls are 11½-inches thick with rigid foam insulation that has an R-value of 30, and the attic floor has 18 inches of blown-in cellulose with an R-value of 40.

Instead of having eight-foot-deep frost walls and a 12-to-18-inch poured slab which require an enormous amount of concrete (not a green material), we have no frost walls and a reinforced slab that is 18-inches thick on the perimeter and only six-inches thick in the center. We have three inches of rigid foam insulation under the slab and three feet beyond the perimeter. This creates a dome effect underneath the house that captures geothermal heat from the earth. The unheated basement

stays at nearly 60 degrees all winter.

The construction of the house is so tight that a ventilation system is required to prevent indoor air pollution. We have two six-inch tubes on opposite sides of each of our two heated floors. Every 70 seconds, one tube brings in air while the other exhausts air. Then they reverse. In the winter they capture 93% of the heat going out and use it to heat up the air coming in.

We equipped this house differently than the other. It is heated with a cold climate heat pump, and we have a heat pump water heater. All the lighting in the house is LED, and all the appliances are Energy Star. We also have Tesla batteries through Green Mountain Power's program, which provide backup power for us when the grid is down. They also allow GMP to draw green energy from our house when they need additional power, for which we're paid. The house is entirely all-electric, except for a small amount of propane used for our cook-top.

We are happy to use almost no fossil fuel and to realize that going this route hasn't been costly for us. Although both houses are considered energy efficient, the newer house is more so. Based on our energy bills in 2018 and 2019, the larger house costs \$1.73 per square foot to operate, and the smaller one costs \$1.10 per square foot, which includes the earnings from our solar panels and our Tesla batteries.

Anyone with a concern about climate change and their pocket book might consider some of the steps we've taken, even if you have no plans to build a new house. Buying heaters, appliances, and fixtures that are energy efficient, generating your own solar energy, and taking advantage of Green Mountain Power's net metering and Tesla battery programs are steps to consider.

Many of you attended a fair here when the house was under construction, and we hope you will return to see the nearly finished product.



News from Londonderry Transfer Station

The Londonderry Transfer Station has reopened for service on Sundays from Noon - 4 PM. Please welcome Seth McLaughlin, the new Sunday attendant. Textiles are once again being accepted; clothes, shoes and fabrics - no pillows. Redeemable bottles and cans can be left once again at the shed to the left of the trash dump. However, please note that the Take-It-Or-Leave-It stall will remain closed for now. Please wear a mask and keep a minimum distance of 6 feet between you and others.

In preparation for the July 1st food scrap ban, we now have a limited number of backyard compost bins for sale. Visit http://www.londonderryvt.org/wpcontent/uploads/2020/05/Compost-container-pricelist-2020-Inludes-tax.pdf for pricing and order information, or call the Londonderry Town Office at 824-3356.

Beginning July 1, food scraps can no longer go into the trash. This law applies to residents as well as businesses. You may bring all your food scraps, coffee grinds, shells, meat, bones, cooking oil, etc. to the Transfer Station for disposal in our compost area. If you choose to compost at home and do not put meat or bones in your home compost, you are urged to put these in the compost area; however, it is legal to put them in the trash.

Also starting July 1, state law (Act 69 of 2019) prohibits stores and food service establishments from providing the following single-use products: 1)Single-use plastic carryout bags at the point of sale, (This does not apply to bags used for prescription meds, dry cleaning, produce bags, and other small bags that are not at the point of sale; single-use paper bags can be offered at the point of sale for a minimum customer charge of 10 cents per bag, which stores keep); 2) Expanded polystyrene (commonly called Styrofoam) food and beverage containers; 3)Plastic straws and 4)Plastic stirrers.
